News from the Coulee Chapter:

Since the last newsletter our group went on two camping events at Goose Island. These were attended by several kids, mainly girls, and mentors of both genders. These outings are the ultimate outdoor experience. Goose Island has playground equipment, extensive shoreline fishing areas, a swimming beach, hiking trails, bathrooms, showers, and more. Our kids set trail cams, swam, cooked food, enjoyed neon wands in the dark, star gazed, helped cook meals and s'mores on the stove and coals of the fire. They did an outstanding job of helping with chores and maintaining a clean and orderly trailer.

We had an off-site adventure during each camping trip. During the first trip several kids visited a local horse ranch. On the last trip just this past week, they went to Reno, MN to shoot archery at the home of a man who runs a youth mentoring program there. We were invited to return there anytime. This home is right on the Pool 8 spillway so the kids have excellent access to fishing there. The humidity and mosquitoes were just awful in the Reno area that day, so we ended up taking the group of 3 mentors and 6 kids to the Rivoli for a movie as a small reprieve. We toured the Nina and Pinta vessels three weeks ago at Riverside Park while there on a Sunday followed by a museum and garden tour. This group numbered nineteen.

Our trap/ pigeon shoot was held yesterday with 15 participants. Eight of these were kids, some of whom are becoming young adults with driver's licenses and able to drive themselves there. The older kids' trapshooting marksmanship has improved greatly over their time with us to the point where it is downright remarkable and some of the adults are reluctant to

shoot after they see what the kids just did. These kids are ready for duck, pheasant, grouse hunting adventures.

We will be taking a group on the Best Dam Fishing Float on August 27th. Several of the participants are brand new to the group.

We are preparing to partner with Kicking Bear during the upcoming youth deer gun and archery seasons. The Kicking bear group would like some of our kids and mentors to join them on archery hunts and one place they go is Missouri to an outfitter there and it is free to the kids. If anyone from another chapter wants to get in on this, please let me know.
