We are gearing up for our Tuesday, June 21st annual pontoon ride event which is open to the public and has been heavily advertised. We have 9 pontoons available. Participants will get a ride past the downtown area and back from the West Clinton Street Landings. They will have the opportunity to sign up for other events and to be put on our mailing list. This is probably our signature event of the year.

Our group is spending the last of the Franke grant dollar on outdoor gear. We just purchased camping and fishing equipment and will buy rain suits, wind breakers, and cold weather gear next. We just submitted another grant to cover our general operating expenses for the next few years.

We are trying to coordinate camping events at local parks. Perrot Park (and other state parks) allow non-profit groups to come in for a cost of \$10.00 per night no matter how many tents are set up. We plan to take advantage of this in July and August and run events day and night for two to three day stints for those who want to come just to visit for a while or to stay. We will fly kites, teach orienteering, hike, fish, and enjoy the amenities of the facility such as the classroom displays there.
